since, ever since

'since' and 'ever since' are used in similar ways. Both are used to show that time has elapsed between two events.

'since' and 'ever since' can also be used to show that one event was the reason for another.

Both 'since' and 'ever since' can be found at the beginning or in the middle of a sentence.

Example A

Farah was sent to the hospital last week. Farah is still at the hospital now.

Answer

Farah has been in the hospital **since** last week.

NOTE:

The tense changes from 'was' in the given sentence to 'has been' in the answer. This shows that Farah was in the hospital from then until now.

Example B

George is a changed person. George changed when he met Mathilda.

Answer

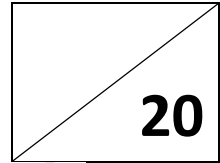
Ever since George met Mathilda, he has been a changed person.

NOTE:

The name 'George' is mentioned one time only. When we refer to the same person again, we use the pronoun 'he'.
