'either' is used when two subjects are mentioned and both are equally good. It is also used to show that only one of two subjects is doing something.

Example 1

One of the two girls over there is eating.

Either girl over there is eating.

Example 2

Gretel may choose to buy this flat. Gretel may choose to buy the other flat.

Gretel may choose to buy either flat.

Example 3

You may use this car or that one.

You may use either car.

Example 4

Both these stories are interesting enough to read to a five-year-old.

Either story is interesting enough to read to a five-year-old.

Example 5

The brothers stole the rambutans from one of the trees.

The brothers stole the rambutans from either tree.
